Isaiah 43:18-19

We go into the new year as new people because those good and bad things have reshaped us and changed who we are; some for the better and some not so good. T.S. Eliot wrote,

Dear friends at St. Mark's,

I have not ever been one to set New Year's resolutions. Each year the new year comes, I say to myself that I'm going to eat better, drink more water, spend less, exercise more, be more organized, or give up social media once and for all. However, by the second week of January, anything I thought I would do in the new year, quickly fades away about as fast as I throw out the previous year's calendar.

What if instead of resolutions for the year, we set intentions for ourselves? Intentions such as loving more, and being angry less; spreading hope and less fear; playing more and working less, or living

out acts of generosity instead of scarcity. No matter what it is, know that God has called you and claimed you in this world as a beloved child of God.

Quilt raffle raises \$1585

St. Mark's quilters and the Mission Committee sold raffle tickets during November and December. The result: \$1585.00 to be distributed to the Cameroon roof fund and Lutherans Outdoors. Winners of the four quilts were Deb Carrier, Holly Hirsch, the Boys and Girls Club, and Janine Scott.

The drawing also awarded six lap quilts won by the Boys and Girls Club, Pam Schmidt, Kellie Reves, Jeanett Fink, Dana Yost, and Cathy Jaragoske.

During 2022, St. Mark's quilters donated a total of 124 quilts to 14 different local organizations and individuals. In addition, the group provided three baby blankets, 30 prayer shawls, four baptism blankets, and 14 pillow cases.



The story of the "Cozy Quilt"

The Cozy Quilt raffled by St. Mark's quilters was actually made some 30 years ago by Jan Nelson's mother, Arvella Jacobson. Arvella passed away in 2013 at the age of 90.

During her lifetime, she

made hundreds of quilts, giving them as gifts to her four children and 13 grandchildren, who received quilts as wedding gifts. She also made many quilts as a 60-plus year member of Center Lutheran Church in Salem.

The quilters of West Prairie Lutheran Church in Lennox finished the hand stitching for the Cozy Quilt, one of the last quilts made by Arvella.

Jan Nelson and the quilters of St. Mark's generously included the Cozy Quilt in the recent raffle.

A huge thank you to everyone at St. Mark's for your remarkable generosity in helping us reach our goal of raising funds for a roof on a church in Cameroon. It's been a year-long project. January Book Study is Don't Look Back


St. Mark's Book Study group meets Thursdays at 10:00 a.m. The January selection is *Don't Look Back*.

Council Minutes

St. Mark's Lutheran Church Council December 20, 2022

Present: Luanne Alberty, Karin Lindell, Pastor Lori Hope, Vicar Sawyer Vanden Heuvel, Sally Turner, Kent Alberty, Mark Smith, April Hokanson, Becky Luke

Devotions: Becky shared devotions that reminded us to let go and let God.

Minutes: We reviewed the minutes from the previous council meeting. MSC.

Old Business: We discussed the following old business.

Website – We will have a "final" draft hopefully before the end of the year. We can possibly go live mid January.

RIC Taskforce – they will alter their wording because St. Mark's is already a very welcoming congregation. The current wording implies that we are changing to become a welcoming congregation.

COVID procedures – We will revisit returning the tables to the narthex before Easter but will leave the chairs in place for now. The congregation is welcome to visit in the reflection room.

Treasurer's Report: The copier cost is over budget but Pastor is going to talk with Linda about printing bulletins in black and white more often. The finance manager is over budget but this was a learning year. Next year's budget amount is more realistic.

President's Report: Nothing new.

Pastor's Report: The Sunday school program was wonderful!

Vicar's Report: Nothing new.

New Business

- Annual meeting Our annual meeting will be on January 29, 2023. We will have a potluck after the 10:45 service and the meeting will start approximately at 12:30. All families are asked to bring an entrée. Last names starting with A through L are asked to also bring a salad; last names starting with M through Z are asked to also bring a dessert.
- The Executive Committee presented a proposed budget. Some items to note:
 - ♦ Budget surplus We currently have \$34,000 in the Property Projects section of the Building Expense budget. We would like to carry that into the next year so we can pay off a \$35,000 non-member loan in March. MSC
 - ♦ Internship income we are no longer receiving the \$10,000 to help supplement the cost.
 - ♦ Overall increase is about 10%.
 - ♦ We didn't have to dip into our savings.
- Constitution Update Several recommendations for our church constitution came out of the church-wide assembly earlier this year. Karin will update the constitution as appropriate for our church and will compose an email for the congregation. This will be sent by December 29 so we can vote on the updated constitution at the annual meeting.

Committee Reports

Youth: They had to cancel their Christmas party last week. They are going to try again on December 21.

Chris Ed: Going well. Lots of kids and we need volunteers.

Property: Kent has contacted a company to inspect the roof, which is planned once the weather clears a bit. The sound board needs to be sent in to fix the mixer. The old one will be reconnected while the new one is out.

Nominating: It's time to nominate new committee members. Let Luanne know if you have any ideas for people for any committee.

We closed the meeting with prayer petitions and the Lord's Prayer.
