Uncle Roy's nativity scene



The nativity scene carvings in the narthex during Christmas were carved by A. Roy McCrae, the great-uncle of Cathy Brechtelsbauer.

Cathy's Uncle Roy (1889-1979) was a person undaunted by his disabilities. He and three siblings (from a family of eight children) were albino with very weak eyes. Roy was legally blind and walked with a cane, but at about age 76 decided to try some artwork.

"We could tell he had been painting," Cathy says, "by the paint on his nose." One day while waiting for the paint to dry, he started whittling. After that he enjoyed woodcarving more than painting because he could do a lot by feel. If there was a scrap of wood around, he seemed compelled to carve it.

Besides the manger scene, he carved a whole crucifixion scene, which was lost in a fire at Cathy's sister's house.

Uncle Roy would hope we would all be blessed by the one who came to earth "to bring good news to the poor."


A joy-filled book study

The Journey

Did you know that St. Mark's has an RIC task force? The task force was formed in December 2022 after a small group of members attended a Safe Zone Training with the South Dakota Synod in 2020. The task force has two main goals: to become a member of the Reconciling in Christ program officially and to continue providing educational and informational forums on topics that impact marginalized and underrepresented groups.

What is an RIC congregation?

An RIC congregation is a congregation that has met the requirements set by ReconcilingWorks. Requirements include establishing an open and affirming call policy and wedding policy; and having a welcome statement, that includes languages related to a commitment to racial equity and support of LGBTQIA2S+ people.

Who is ReconcilingWorks? ReconcilingWorks is an independent non-profit organization that is a trusted ministry partner in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. In 1974, they began their advocacy for full participation of Lutheran members in all aspects of the life of their Church, congregations, synods, and communities, and in 1983, they established the RIC program as "a public way for faith communities to see, name, celebrate, and advocate for people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions in the Lutheran church. <u>Click here</u> to learn more about ReconcilingWorks, its mission and vision, and the RIC program.

What has the task force been doing since its creation in 2022?

We are proud to share that the task force has been working hard over the past year and accomplished the successes below:

- Held numerous one-to-one visits with members, on the RIC process.
- Offered multiple forums in 2021 on how to become an RIC church.
- Offered two information forums on their work and the RIC process in October and November 2023.
- Created wedding and call policies with guidance from St. Mark's pastoral staff. These policies were approved by the Church Council on August 15, 2023.

What is next for the task force?

The task force is planning the next action steps for 2024 and beyond.

- Offer a panel discussion forum on Sunday, January 14, at 9:30 a.m. and Thursday, January 18, at 7:00 p.m. Select panelists will share their personal experiences as they engage in a dialogue about faith, sexuality, gender identity, and racial equity.
- Take steps towards a potential congregational vote in Spring 2024 for St. Mark's to become a member of the RIC program.
- Continue The Journey forums, providing educational and informational material on topics that impact marginalized and underrepresented groups.

St. Mark's Lutheran Church Council Meeting Minutes 12/19/2023

Devotions – Pastor Sawyer shared devotions. Darrell has them for January.

Minutes - MSC.

Treasurer's report - MSC

President's report – Lucia went wonderfully. Over 300 people attended between the two nights. We received over \$2500 for the Banquet.

Pastor Lori's report – The Sunday school Christmas Program was delightful.

Pastor Sawyer's report – New member night included six households joining. He is working with Deb to set up Tithely, an online giving option. This is not replacing Simply Giving, but is a great option for one-time giving. Tithely has a credit card option.

Vicar's report – She really enjoyed Lucia. She and Pastor Lori just submitted her three-month review.

Committee Reports

Finance – Let's talk budget. There is a \$48,000 shortfall. They recommend an additional stewardship drive, shifting some of the mortgage money, possibly pausing the internship program (although this only saves \$12,000 in 2024). After much discussion, members of the Council brought the following amendments forward.

- Amend the budget to drop the Property Project to \$10,000 MSC
- Amend the budget to increase the Synod contribution budget to \$15,000 MSC
- Amend the water and sewer budget to \$1300 MSC
- The Council will send the recommended budget with a shortfall to the congregation MSC.

The extra money in Property Projects is still there for 2023. We could use those next year as necessary, within the boundaries of the bylaws and constitution.

Youth – They continue to have fun as the year progresses.

Mission – They propose to put the RIC Journey information in the Servant in January. No objections. **Christian Ed** – The Christmas program was great. The Sunday school numbers are consistently at 28 or above. If this continues, we will seriously need to consider bringing on a paid Christian Education Coordinator like we used to have.

Worship and Music – They had a wonderful volunteer turnout to decorate the church for Christmas. They purchased another communion tray so they should have enough for all services now.

Property – They just found out the downstairs girls bathroom toilet is not working. They also need to re-sign the bathrooms downstairs to be gender neutral.

Congregational Well Being – They got the college packages sent. Truman told Pastor Lori that he really appreciated his.

Old Business

Local benevolence – After discussion this will all go to Pastor's Discretionary fund. MSC. We will have wording updates to the constitution on the ballot at the annual meeting. The Council approved them last year, but we forgot to add them to the ballot for the annual meeting.

New Business

None at this time.

We closed with our prayer concerns and the Lord's Prayer.

MSC to adjourn.
