A festival of song

Deacon John Weit visited Sioux Falls during April to share information and instruction on *All Creation* Sings (ACS), the worship and song supplement recently purchased by All Creation Sings St. Mark's. Deacon John serves as Executive for Worship of the ELCA. ACS includes 200 hymns and songs supporting the lessons and liturgies of the church year with an emphasis on the themes of healing and wholeness, creation care, justice and

peace, praise and lament. More than 30 of the songs are multilingual.

The Sunday workshop drew attendees from St. Mark's and churches around Sioux Falls. Musical selections included songs for the seasons of the church year: Advent, Christmas and Epiphany, Lent, Easter, and All Saints Day. Deacon Weit also led songs expressing prayers for peace and justice around the world.

St. Mark's choir (shown rehearsing below) helped lead songs during the workshop.

In addition to leading workshops at Augustana University and St. Mark's, Deacon Weit played at all three worship services on April 22 and 23, performing the prelude, postlude, and special numbers.

Siblings in Christ,

For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return there without watering the earth and making it bear and sprout, and furnishing seed to the sower and bread to the eater.

Isaiah 55:10

This time of year as the buds burst from the trees, as the flowers seem to bloom and grow overnight and as the birds sing proudly each morning; we are reminded of life from death. The line from "The Rose," written by Amanda McBroom and made famous by Bette Midler, comes to mind,

Just remember in the winter far beneath the bitter snows lies the seed that with the sun's love in the spring becomes the rose.

It is so easy to forget this good news when we are facing trouble, when we are overwhelmed or when we are afraid.

Dear St. Mark's Family:

"What's Next?"

This question keeps coming up as my time at St. Mark's draws towards the end. For starters, I am still with you as your vicar until the middle of August. So don't worry; there is still time for more fun and certainly time for more coffee. In other words, there's still work to be done and I'm not leaving you quite yet.

This new movement of community that we read about in Acts, of what we now call "church," didn't come with a set plan or a roadmap. Jesus had simply given a command to go and be witnesses in the world. The early followers of Jesus had just experienced awe, wonder, and mystery on Pentecost and were now asking, "What's next?" They were sitting in this liminal space, working together "day by day" to figure out where to go from there.

This is where I feel that I am at this stage in my life. I was first called to go to seminary to be prepared through theological education to be sent out into the world with knowledge and skills for ministry. St. Mark's has been a part of that formation as I become a pastor in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. On May 21, I will celebrate this milestone of earning a Master of Divinity degree from Luther Seminary. Alongside of this graduation milestone, I will have my approval interview for ordination with the faculty, and then at the end of June, I will have a final approval interview with the South Dakota Synod's candidacy committee. Going through the approval process will be another milestone to celebrate! It means that the church affirms that I am fit and called for ordained ministry. This is where the fun will start as I await a call to serve in Christ's church.

This summer, I will have a consultation with the Bishop and the synod about where God might be calling me next. This is where the synod will work to match my gifts with a ministry site waiting for a pastor to come and serve them. So until that call comes, I will be sitting in that "what's next?" liminal space. I will be discerning, alongside many others, where the Holy Spirit is leading me.

But during all of this waiting and discernment, I will continue to break bread with others, participate in this community we call St. Mark's Lutheran Church, and do ministry together for the sake of the neighbor. I think it is exciting because there is no clear road map. I put my trust in God, through the power of the Holy Spirit, to guide me in "what's next."

Thanks be to God for this calling to serve in Christ's Church!


Starting on Memorial Day weekend, St. Mark's will follow the summer schedule for worship services:

St. Mark's serves The Banquet on May 17



St. Mark's is scheduled to serve The Banquet (900 East 8th Street) on Wednesday, May 17, Volunteers are needed for the 2:00 p.m. shift that prepares the meal and the 5:15 p.m. shift that serves the meal. A sign up sheet is available in the narthex. Volunteers can also use the app that The Banquet has set up on SignUpGenius.

The Banquet meal ministry was founded in 1985 starting with just one meal per week. They now serve 16 meals per week at two locations. The Banquet is a volunteer-based ministry: meals are paid for, prepared by, and served by volunteer groups. In 2020 The Banquet served over 200,000 meals. At least 25,000 of those meals were served to children under 12.


St. Mark's assists with Native American Honoring Ceremony



For the past several years, the Sioux Falls School District has held an honoring ceremony for Indigenous students. This year St. Mark's will be providing cupcakes and cake for the 8th grade students and high school graduates at the ceremony.

New additions to St. Mark's library

St. Mark's member Renee Splichal Larson has recently published her first book *A Witness* about her experience in the 2010 Haiti earthquake.

Renee, just 27 at the time, lost her husband Ben, who was buried in the rubble of the quake.

Renee offers us an honest look at the years of struggle and healing that followed the loss of Ben along with the thousands of lives lost in the devastation. She shares her young romance, her experience of the earthquake, and the journey that followed. Most of all, she proclaims her hard-won witness: that in Christ, love and life conquer death.

Renee is a pastor in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. She is married to Jonathan Splichal Larson, who is also a pastor in the ELCA. They have 2 sons, Gabriel and Elias.

A Witness has been added to St. Mark's library and is also available on Amazon.

We have also added a copy of *Belonging* by Karoline M. Lewis. *Belonging* was the text for St. Mark's recent Bible study. The book helps readers understand and live out Christian discipleship in a way that is most deeply authentic for themselves, centering on the story of the Samaritan woman. It can be used for personal as well as group study.

Devotions – Angie shared devotions.

Minutes – Clarification: We have 35 kids actively participating in Sunday school, not 35 kids coming every week. MSC.

Treasurer's report – We've had a lot of good giving in April. \$1900 of the \$2000 for repairs to property was for the soundboard. Snow removal was paid all at once because the contractor had the wrong email but didn't want to say anything to us.
