Vicar's Notes

Reflections on Tennis Camp

Jesus Christ calls us to be his disciples. In the Gospel of Luke, Jesus increased the number of disciples. On his journey to Jerusalem he commissioned 70 disciples and he sent them ahead of him. They were to be guests in homes; they were to heal and preach; and they were to proclaim, "The kingdom of God has come near to you" (Luke 10:9). Jesus taught his disciples a valuable lesson: to become a welcoming community and to embody the kingdom of God, they first must become a humble guest. They must eat what the host cooks! Jesus taught the disciples that to be good givers, they first must be good receivers. He taught them that discipleship begins with God and what *God has done for us*—not us. He taught them that being good receivers would open them up to the wonders of God's creation.



We held tennis camp at St. Mark's June 7, 8, and 9, and we "commissioned" 16 new disciples. They were guests at our church, and hopefully they experienced the kingdom of God.

The theme of the camp was, "Fruit of the Spirit" (Galatians 5). One of the activities that we did to bring this theme to light was growing bean plants. They

learned that potting soil comes from God, that seed comes from God, and that water and sun to help incubate the plant comes from God. The kids learned that their faith, the faith that will help them in any storm, grows when they humbly open themselves up to the gifts God has bestowed on them. The fruit of the spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control comes from receiving the gifts of God first. Who knows which one of our disciples will be the next Paul or Mary Magdalene?

We have received new members on three different occasions.



How flags and lapel pins have helped Ukraine

A big *Thank You* for all the donations to support the people of Ukraine and those helping to resettle them. Donations are helping through Lutheran Disaster Response, which is operating in Eastern Europe where Ukrainians have been fleeing.

At St. Mark's soon after the invasion, Cathy Larson and I (mostly Cathy L.) made some small Ukraine flags because many people wanted to show their support. We gave some of the flags to local Ukrainian families.



At one point, a man insisted on paying for a flag and gave us \$20 for it. We realized that this could be a way to raise funds. Cathy L. made more flags and Cathy Wencil ordered some flags and lapel pins. Before long, the lapel pins were gone and we ordered more.

For several weekends the flags and pins were available at church for a donation. Flags and pins that remained were taken to the hunger table at Synod Assembly where more donations came in. Finally, we took what was

left to our flag booth at Festival of Cultures and received more donations.

When only one flag remained, I took it along with our other flags to the Dalesburg Midsommer festival on June 24.

At the festival a little boy named Jack had decided to buy a flag. I explained that the sales of our flags and blumenkranz support St. Mark's mission trips, but we had the Ukraine flag for donations to help the people of Ukraine. Jack was very interested in flags, as he was a great geographer himself. He and I spent much of my time there discussing the many flags and countries of the world. Eventually, he decided to buy the Ukraine flag. He said he chose that one because to do so would help the people of Ukraine.

May God bless all these donations and the work of Lutheran Disaster Response. I hope the donors feel blessed already.

Book Study to discuss Torn

Torn: Rescuing the Gospel from the Gays-vs.-Christians Debate by Justin Lee is the topic of a St. Mark's book study. Discussion is scheduled for Tuesday, July 26, at 7:00 p.m.

In his memoir, Justin Lee, a gay man and devout Christian, talks about his faith and sexuality. As a teenager and young man, Lee felt deeply torn. Nicknamed "God Boy" by his peers, he knew that he was called to a life in the evangelical Christian ministry.

But Lee also knew that he was gay. Lee recalls the events—his coming out to his parents, his experiences with the "ex-gay" movement, and his in-depth study of the Bible—that led him, eventually, to self-acceptance.

Convinced that "in a culture that sees gays and Christians as enemies, gay Christians are in a unique position to bring peace," Lee demonstrates that people of faith on both sides of the debate can respect, learn from, and love one another.

My choices, it seemed, were to be branded a sinner and live my life alone; to abandon my faith, the one thing I held most dear in the entire world; or to lie to everyone, pretend I was straight, and forget about it all. — Justin Lee

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2022 Synod Assembly Recap

The 2022 South Dakota Synod Assembly was held on June 3-4, 2022 at Our Savior's Lutheran Church in Sioux Falls, SD. It was good to be gathered as God's people in South Dakota for the first time in person since 2019. Pastors, deacons, lay members, and visitors gathered each day in worship to center ourselves on the necessary work of the church. Assembly participants were invited to *imagine* new ways of being church through a series of Imagination Labs. In addition to worship and learning, here are some of the highlights of the synod assembly:

- Rev. Keith Fry, executive for administration in the Office of the Secretary, delivered the ELCA report on behalf of our Presiding Bishop, Rev. Elizabeth Eaton. Together, the congregations in the South Dakota Synod made it possible for the synod to share \$812,120 with the churchwide organization to support our ministry together. Our deep faith and strong relationships across the ELCA provide the foundation for Mission Support sharing each year.
- Bishop Constanze Hagmaier shared highlights of the past year of synod ministry including the call of Pastor Alan Blankenfeld to serve as the synod's Rural Ministry Liaison and the formation of the Digital Ministry Task Force. These new initiatives will support congregations and ministry sites of the South Dakota Synod as we imagine new ways of being church together in order that the Gospel will continue to be proclaimed throughout the South Dakota Synod. The "Church Basement Ladies" from Split Rock Lutheran Church provided commentary and challenged us all to not be afraid of change.
- Peggy Hahn, Executive Director of LEAD (Living Everyday as Disciples), was the keynote speaker. Peggy challenged us to think of "church" as a verb: from *going to church* to *sent to be the church*.
- Throughout the assembly, Glocal Musicians provided music leadership. Glocal is a coalition of musician educators that create music influenced by global themes in communities worldwide.
- Actions approved by the Synod Assembly included:
 - Election of new South Dakota Synod Council Members and approval of synod committee members.
 - Approval of new compensation and guidelines for rostered and lay staff.
 - A memorial was adopted to the 2022 Churchwide Assembly to review the process for on leave from call roster status.
 - The 2023 Mission Plan for the South Dakota Synod was adopted.

Thank you to all who participated in the synod assembly this year. St. Mark's delegates were Dawn Hartigan, Cary Wencil, and Pastor Lori.

Devotions: Karin provided devotions. Sally Turner has devotions for the next meeting.

Minutes: We reviewed the minutes from the previous council meeting. MSC.

Old Business: We discussed the following old business.

The endowment signature card is now up to date.

We have no COVID procedures changes.

Instead of a Corn Feed, we are doing a neighborhood pie and ice cream social on August 2, the National Night Out.

We discussed at length background checks for our volunteers. We have the synod guidelines. We want to update that form to remove waiting six months before a person can help. We will also reword the sexual predator section. We will send the entire document to council before approving.

Treasurer's Report: We reviewed the treasurer's report. MSC

President's Report: Nothing really new.

Pastor's Report: Pastor shared greetings from Michael Kruse, a past youth director at St. Mark's. She officiated his wedding this past weekend.

Vicar's Report: Tennis camp went great. We had 16 kids and eight coaches.

New Business

Kevin Olson resigned as treasurer and from counting. We need to replace him as treasurer but discussed redefining the position. Included in the discussion:

Person would be on finance and council as ex officio.

Two-year term appointed by council

This person would review and initial all invoices

The treasurer will have the ability to sign checks

We discussed paying off member loans. The initial goal was to have them all paid off by March 2023. We have over \$114k in loans. We do have a \$35k, non-member loan. We discussed paying that one off in March. We will revisit this in October.

Kerri Smith joined us to discuss St. Lucia. We have been doing this festival for about 45 years. We are going back to our old format and have it open to the public. The days this year are December 9 and 10. We need volunteers to help with costumes, food, and finances.

Pastor is thinking of ways for the congregation to reconnect. She's thought about Circle of Eight. These will be sessions of about eight people, not counting her and a person from council. We want to do this separate from stewardship, so these should start in August.

Vicar Leif's last Sunday is August 7.

Our committee question for next month: If St. Mark's received a \$100k unrestricted gift, what should we do with it?

Committee Reports

Youth: We will be going to a Canaries game in the future. Pastor discovered she's not 21 anymore after playing sand volleyball with the kids.

Mission: Tin Roof Sundae was a big success with over \$2000 raised toward a Cameroon roof. LSS has brought in a Ukrainian family and a Congolese family. We will be participating in God's Work, Our Hands on September 11. We are thinking of serving a meal that day as well. Church will still be at 10:00 even though it's after Labor Day.

Worship and Music: We are reviewing a supplemental hymnal.

Property: We will not reseed until fall. The new cleaning lady is amazing.

We closed the meeting with prayer petitions and the Lord's Prayer.
