On Easter Sunday, April 9, St. Mark's will have services at 7:00 and 10:00 a.m. The choir will sing at both services: "Christ Is Risen! Alleluia!" and "Hallelujah, Glory Hallelujah!" There will not be a Saturday service on Easter weekend.

## **Pastor's Letter**

#### Dear St. Mark's Family,

As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night, shall not cease.

Genesis 8:22

This month as we wait for the snow to melt and temperature to warm, we will gather to celebrate Easter. We know all about the cold of winter, endless snow, death, loss and fear. This verse from Genesis is at the end of the Noah story; after all the loss and devastation.

Walter Brueggemann relates this verse to the whole story of God,

Every time, that the resolve of God: opens what is closed down, hope against hopelessness, overrides despair in resolve, and makes all things new!



We are Easter people who call a thing what it is! We name the pain, trauma, loss, hopelessness, anger, fear and injustice. We name it and then we are reminded that God or messengers of God show up to say, "Do not be afraid" or "Fear not." We are reminded that winter does not last forever even when it feels like it might. Even on the longest night, dawn eventually breaks. When it seems that death, fear and brutality will win; life, hope and peace break through.

Now, now as the flowers pop up from the ground and the buds burst forth on the trees, we put our hands in the dirt to plant the seed and we see that there is really grass under all that snow and the grass turns green. We live into the reality of life after what looked and felt like only death.

Rachel Carson writes, "Those who contemplate the beauty of the earth find reserves of strength that will endure as long as life lasts. There is something infinitely healing in the repeated refrains of nature...the assurance that dawn comes after night, and spring after winter."

#### St. Mark's Lenten and Easter Offerings

Offerings at the Wednesday Lenten services and at St. Mark's Easter services will be divided between Refugee Resettlement and Lutheran Disaster Response. Here is a summary of the work of each organization:

#### **Refugee Resettlement**

The LSS refugee resettlement program is helping about 600 new Americans adapt to their new home—English as a second language, cultural assimilation, citizenship—along with finding housing and arranging for other basic living needs. At one time, a coalition of several churches supported the program, but presently St. Mark's is the primary supporting organization. We have donated such items as furniture, kitchen supplies, household goods, and clothing. Our Lenten/Easter financial donation will make a positive difference for this important program.



Lutheran Disaster Response is the ELCA's ministry to provide short and long-term recovery when disasters strike in the United States and around the world. Lutheran Disaster Response stays in a community after a disaster to provide both immediate relief and assistance with long-term recovery. *Close to home:* Beaver Valley Lutheran Church, in Brandon, South Dakota, was hit by a tornado on May 30. The tornado damaged their building, with the most damage in the church offices and education areas. With a grant from Lutheran Disaster Response, through the South Dakota Synod, the Beaver Valley congregation bought new computers and office equipment, relocated their preschool and created four produce stands to supply their community with fresh fruits and vegetables.



#### Outreach project at Red Shirt Table is scheduled for May 5-7



The Native American Outreach task force will travel to the Pine Ridge reservation May 5 through May 7 to participate in a work day. We will be installing the flooring for a new community Coffeehouse at Red Shirt Table.

Here are the details:

- May 5: Travel day. We will be based at Outlaw Ranch for the weekend.
- May 6: Work day at Red Shirt Table. Install flooring.
- May 7: Worship service at Woyatan Lutheran Church in Rapid City. Return to Sioux Falls.
- **Donations:** We are also asking for your help to raise money to pay for the flooring and other necessary materials. Thrivent action team grants will help us to meet our \$1,000 goal. If you wish to contribute, you can donate by check to St Mark's and put "Pine Ridge Project" on the memo line.
- Volunteers: We are looking for a few more people who want to join us for this service project. If you are interested please contact Doug or Shirley Larson, Kent or Luanne Alberty, or Kari Sansgaard.

#### St. Mark's to host delegates from Cameroon for the Synod Assembly

#### The 2023 Offering of Letters: Nourishing and Sustaining Food Systems

"I came that they may have life and have it abundantly." -John 10:10

This is an important year for letters to Congress, because it is the once-every-5-year update of the farm bill. Not only does its \$15-billion taxpayer budget control the direction of agriculture in our country, it also includes critical nutrition programs. Thus, we are writing now to ask for policies that promote sustainable agricultural practices and that let hungry people be fed.

To promote nourishing and sustaining food systems, the upcoming Farm Bill should:

- Support and expand local food systems. Farmers need infrastructure to be able to sell their products locally and regionally.
- Shift power to local farmers and communities, not corporations, especially to support regenerative land practices and protection of water sources.
- Promote, incentivize and support sustainable agricultural practices that ensure farmers' ability to prevent and adapt to climate change.
- Increase equitable and just land transition for minority and beginning farmers. Farmers aged 65+ outnumber farmers 35 or younger by 6 to 1.
- Invest in rural development and livelihood. Include priorities of Native Americans on nutrition programs, rural development and agriculture.
- Reduce barriers to nourishing foods for households. 13% of Americans are food-insecure. This year Bread for the World-SD and the sustainable ag group Dakota Rural Action are making

the Offering of Letters (OL) a joint effort. There will be informational handouts and a SD-specific letter writing flyer using the overlapping platform points of the two groups. A good deal of info is already available at www.bread.org/OL including discussion on healthy, equitable, and sustainable food systems.

We will have a forum at 9:30 a.m. on Sunday, April 16, with nutritionist Megan Eisenvos, a staffer with Dakota Rural Action. Current and former participants in SNAP or farm conservation programs are welcome to share their experience. Take-home letter packets will be available April 15-23. We will dedicate the letters, as we do other offerings, on April 29-30.
