



"The Earth Is Full of Your Glory" by Pastor Sawyer

"Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory."

-Isaiah 6:3

In our communion liturgy during the "Holy, Holy," we always sing "heaven and earth are full of your glory." This line in the liturgy comes from Isaiah 6:3. It reminds me of how every place we go in the world, whether it is down the street or across the ocean, we are interacting with God's creation. Being in the presence of God's creation stirs us to sing praises as we connect to God and to one another.

Have you ever thought about your connection to the earth? For me, I've always seemed to find myself connecting with God the most when I am out on a hike, a walk, or along the lakeside. Growing up in the rural parts of lowa, most of my entertainment as a child happened in the wonder of being outside. As you go about your day, where do you find yourself in the presence of God?

This month, you will have the chance to think about your own story and your connection to the Earth. I am thrilled to be hosting a storytelling workshop, alongside Pastor Kyle Svennungsen at St. John American Lutheran, with Dr. Mary Hess of Luther Seminary. Dr. Mary will lead our workshop on digital storytelling, faith, and what it means to share stories of our care for creation. This project is a part of Dr. Mary's sabbatical research that is based in studying faith communities and connecting us to the land we live on.

I hope you will join me on **Saturday, April 13,** from **9 AM to 3 PM** at St. John American Lutheran Church (1912 W 13th Street). There is no cost to attend this workshop and a lunch will be provided. Together, we will learn the art of listening to one another and recording our stories into a digital format. Even if you do not have any experience using digital technology, you are more than welcome to attend and be a participant. No previous experience is necessary. Through this interactive workshop, we will find ways to see God's glory throughout all the earth and the heavens above us. "The Lotus Flower" by Vicar Melinda

"God writes the Gospel not in the Bible alone, but on trees and flowers and clouds and stars."

—Martin Luther

Springtime brings so much life with it. Blooming flowers, flourishing vegetation, rain showers, and longer, sunny days. Birds return from their winter vacations, both snowbirds (people) and feathered, flying birds. Baby animals are welcomed into the world. Students prepare to graduate and explore the next step in their life's journey. It is a season of transformation, new life, and resurrection.

Easter is one of the most special celebrations of Spring for me. The process of navigating through Holy Week brings me joy, gives me hope, and reminds me of God's love for the creation. The seasons of Lent and Easter are filled with self-reflection, transformation, new life, and resurrection. Jesus' example of servant leadership in washing the feet and sharing a last meal with the disciples is a model of how we should live and share our lives with others. In a community, serving and caring for each other without exclusions (even Judas was cleaned and fed) brings a spirit of transformation and resurrection. The love displayed on the cross by Christ is an open invitation for all to receive the gift of new life through him.

When I think of transformation, new life, and resurrection, I am reminded of one of my favorite flowers, the Lotus. The Lotus flower is a beautiful flower that blooms out of murky and dark waters. Dr. Dheepa Sundaram, Assistant Professor of Religious Studies at the University of Denver, says "Lotuses only grow in really swampy areas, so that symbolizes this idea that out of ugliness and destruction and unrest, we can all come together in this perfect moment."



The day Christ died, there was unrest in the city surrounded by ugliness and fear. The curtain of the temple was torn in two, from top to bottom on that holy day. Darkness and sadness covered the people and the land. It did not seem like joy could rise again. Then Sunday morning came and the perfect moment happened.

The Lotus flower is a representation that all of creation has beauty within it. Regardless of how its life begins or how dark and murky the waters are where it lives, it can rise and bloom. Saints, we are a representation of God's beautiful and beloved creation. May we always know how precious and loved we are and may we continue to rise and bloom.

April Bible Study: 1 John

Martin Luther, in his lectures on 1 John, said, "This is an outstanding epistle...so beautifully and gently does it picture Christ to us." (LW 30:219)

During the six Sundays after Easter, worship services will include readings from 1 John.

On the four Fridays in April, Bible Study participants will meet at 10:00 a.m. to study the whole book of 1 John (all five chapters!). Weekly themes for study and discussion are:



- Friday, April 5: Who Is Jesus Really?
- Friday, April 12: Who Are We Really?
- Friday, April 19: How Can We Love Really?
- Friday, April 26: How Can We Live Really?

Painting the Stars: Science, Religion and an Evolving Faith

Celebrating the communion of science and faith, *Painting the Stars* explores the promise of evolutionary Christian spirituality. When most people hear the word "evolution," they are thinking primarily about biological evolution. But in order to understand evolutionary spirituality or evolutionary Christianity, we need to appreciate that an evolutionary dynamic extends beyond the realm of the physical. What occurs at the biological level also takes place in the domains of consciousness (psyche and spirit), culture, worldviews, social and political ways of organizing our lives. Participants will watch a 20-minute video featuring thirteen theologians and leaders and then have 40 minutes for discussion and sharing.

St. Mark's Annual "Offering of Letters"

The Offering of Letters is one way that St. Mark's lives out a Christian calling to speak up for those who lack life's basics. Specific messages to Congress work toward reducing hunger and poverty. Policy changes can have a huge effect on whether people can put food on their tables. The Farm Bill is a strong example of such a policy.

Larry Peterson, a member of St. Mark's, reports that the greenhouse garden in Kyle, located on the Pine Ridge reservation, exemplifies the type of project that the Farm Bill can promote. The greenhouse garden is next to the youth center allowing students to be involved in helping to bring more nutritious food to the community. He adds that the funding for rural housing in the recent Farm Bill is also especially helpful on the reservation.

St. Mark's contacts to Congress on hunger and poverty are offerings, gifts of citizen influence, as surely as money in the offering plate. So, St. Mark's dedicates the letters in the same way that other offerings are dedicated.

With other churches and groups around the country writing on the same topic, and all asking God's blessing on these efforts, there is often remarkable success, even in a divided Congress. Bread for the World, a non-partisan Christian advocacy group working to end hunger in God's world, provides leadership for the Offering of Letters. The ELCA is a member of Bread for the World and is represented on the board.

The Offering of Letters is one way that St. Mark's "strives for justice and peace in all the world" (our confirmation promise) and helps others to have the abundant life Jesus said he came to give. (John 10:10) Thank you for your participation.

How to participate:

- Write a letter or send an email. Letters and emails will be dedicated during prayers on Offering
 of Letters weekend, April 13 and 14. Letters can be written at home or at a table in the narthex.
 No stamp is needed; letters will be hand delivered to local congressional offices.
- Email Congress through their websites—or you can personalize the ready-to-email <u>online letter</u> by adjusting the wording and/or adding your motivation for writing.

Second Wind

We have heard most of the quotes about aging:

- "Old age is not for sissies." Bette Davis
- "You know you're getting old when you stoop to tie your shoelaces and wonder what else you could do while you're down there." George Burns

These expressions are maybe funny and even true, but aging is also frustrating and at times overwhelming. Sometimes it seems that our children and our doctors do not take our anger and our right for autonomy seriously.

St. Mark's would like to gather together people who are 65 years and over to talk honestly about the experiences, fears, hopes, and some strategies to live more authentically and proactively. The goal is to create pragmatic strategies and alternatives for meeting the "issues" of old age. The Second Wind group will meet for the first time on Thursday, April 4, at 3:00 p.m. in the education room.

Mission Trip to Pine Ridge

St. Mark's is planning for a group from here to join with volunteers from Custer Lutheran Fellowship for a four-day working trip to Red Shirt Table. Volunteers will assist in the completion of the coffee shop for the Red Shirt community. Last year a group from St. Mark's helped to provide and install flooring and also worked on some outside projects. This year volunteers will finish connecting the water line to the coffee shop, complete indoor plumbing (sinks, toilets, etc.) and do a couple of minor electrical projects. Group members will also help with outside landscaping. The proposed schedule is:

- Thursday, May 2: Travel day. Outlaw Ranch is providing a place to stay for the weekend.
- Friday and Saturday, May 3 and 4: Work days at Red Shirt Table.
- **Sunday, May 5:** Worship service at Woyatan Lutheran Church in Rapid City. Return to Sioux Falls.

Sioux Falls schools Native American Honoring Ceremony

St. Mark's has been asked to provide 10-15 volunteers for the Sioux Falls School District's Native American Honoring Ceremony to be held on Monday, May 13, at the Washington Pavilion. St. Mark's will also provide funds for cupcakes for the event. \$250 was raised at the February 28 Lenten supper—with an additional \$200 needed.

St. Mark's has also agreed to donate at least 10 star quilts to be presented to high school seniors who are honored at the ceremony. Some of the families are not able to provide star quilts for their students; the cost of a quilt is approximately \$200.
